



Principal's Reflection - Joanne Rock



Week 2 of term 4 in a Secondary school is always a bit of an unknown quantity. It is the week that the Year 12 students farewell their communities and head off to put the finishing touches on their examination preparations.

From my past experiences, it can be the best or the worst week of the year, dependent on the choices made by the Year 12 students as to how they want to celebrate this milestone in their life journey. This year we asked our Year 12 students to continue the new tradition of focusing more on celebrating in a fun, gracious and respectful manner so that the whole community could enjoy the day. I am pleased to say the Year 12 students did exactly what was asked of them, setting the tone perfectly.

There was a real sense of joy and celebration as we farewelled our 2019 Year 12 cohort on their last day of 'school' on Thursday 17 October. The mood of the students at their final assembly was upbeat and respectful. During the last school holidays, the Literacy Centre was lucky enough to get a fresh coat of paint and the results are amazing. Many classes have taken up the invitation of using the now two teaching and learning class areas for a range of learning activities, including LFOV interviews, VCE lessons and Year 7 Science research classes. Of course the two areas are used by the entire school population at recess and lunchtimes for a variety of reasons: casual conversation, card games, jigsaw puzzles, Kahoots games or simply to avoid the strange weather or when caught without a hat.



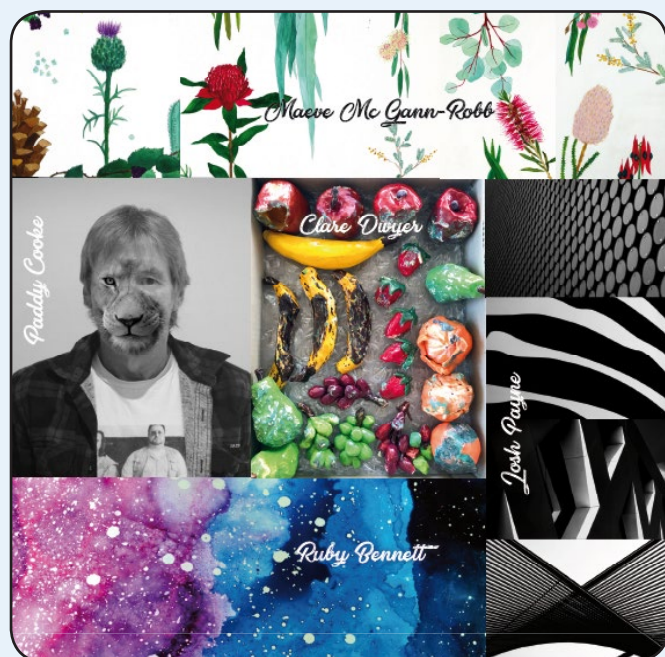
It is important that the school provides an area where students feel welcomed and safe and Ms Rock has met this aspiration head on and supported the endeavours of the Literacy Centre fully. We now have a space where EAL or ESL students can work in peace and are able to concentrate and work on improving their literacy skills, a space where students who are needing extra support can meet a teacher at lunchtime to go over that difficult question, a regular spot when a subject isn't meeting the needs of an individual...the list is endless.

Of course we need to talk about the falling levels of literacy in Australia. One in three students struggle with their understanding of language in Australia and leave school with an unsatisfactory level of literacy. This is an issue that the education system must address. At FCJ College, we are encouraging our students to read more and each English session begins with reading, but where to now? Our Literacy Centre is designed to support and encourage reading and with the purchase of such things as Audio Books, Reader-Pens and Bi-lingual readers, we are hoping to encourage students and see some progress in our school's literacy levels. Audio books provide an excellent opportunity for students to listen to the spoken word and where necessary, follow along with the written word. Some learners are auditory and this can help with their learning style. Audio books are provided for all English curriculum books as well as some for casual reading/listening and are available on SIMON. At the moment, the audio books are only available at school due to network constraints but I have been working with Nettek to see if we can work on making the books available at home as well. This should happen soon (fingers crossed). All teachers are aware of the needs of their individual subjects and their role in the language comprehension of their students and the Literacy Centre is able to support all endeavours in any way possible. This may range from research classes and lessons on writing bibliographies, right through to displays of new books and current events. Anything to support the growth and understanding of our students.

Year 11 PE

In the unit, contemporary issues with physical activity and sport, the class has been researching disabilities and sport. The students have learnt about inclusive policies and how the social ecological model can increase the chances of people with or without disabilities, being encouraged to be active and sustain their activity levels.

As the unit wants our students to experience what they are learning about, we set about finding some way we can experience a disability while being active.

We made some sight adjusting glasses from goggles and safety glasses. Each pair showed the students what it is like to experience colour blindness, tunnel vision, blurred/impaired vision (similar to cataracts) while playing basketball and dodgeball.

They also played goal ball with adapted safety glasses and a modified soccer game using an audible soccer ball.



CONVEYANCE ALLOWANCE

Applications are now open to eligible families to lodge a claim through the Conveyance Allowance Program. The allowance provides financial assistance towards the cost of:

- travel more than 4.8 km by private car to access a free school bus or
- reside more than 4.8 km by the shortest practical route from school and pay to travel on a city bus
- travel to school on a private bus (FCJ College)

Students travelling by private car for more than 4.8kms to a free country school bus pick up or drop off point should complete the application form for private car travel.

Students travelling on a city bus who reside more than 4.8 km from the school purchase a yearly or half yearly bus pass from Benalla Bus Lines. A copy of the receipt should be attached to the application form for public transport travel.

Students travelling by private FCJ College bus are required to complete an application form to travel on a private bus.

Camps Sports Excursion Funding

Are you eligible for the \$225.00 annual payment?

On the first day of term one (29 January 2019) or the first day of term two (23 April 2019), a parent or legal guardian of a student must:

- ♦ be an eligible beneficiary of one of these cards:
 - Veterans Affairs Gold Card
 - Centrelink Health Care Card
 - Pensioner Concession Card
- ♦ OR they must be a temporary foster parent
- ♦ OR the student is 16 years or older and holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card)
- ♦ AND the parent or legal guardian must submit an application by the due date.

Parents who receive a carer allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with the above.

Eligibility will be determined when the parent's concession card successfully validates with Centrelink on either the first day of term one or term two.

If the eligible card is in the name of the student, the fund is only granted to that student, not their siblings.

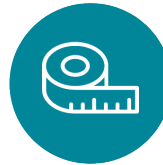
