CULTURAL DAY

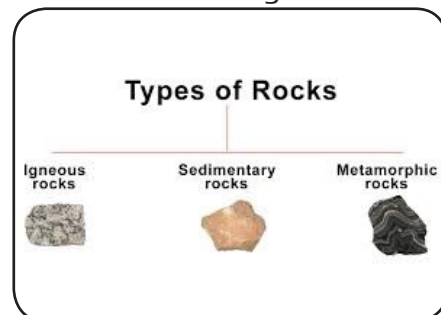

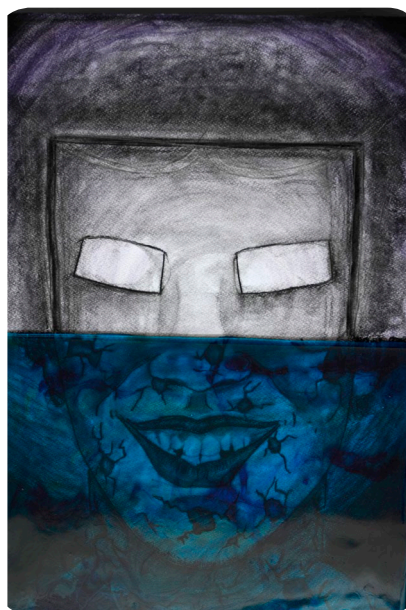

Bonnie shares her experience of a life time.

Imagine sailing through the Whitsunday Islands, looking out to the bluest of seas or the whitest Whitehaven Beach. Dolphins riding the bow by moonlight and being able to watch the sunrise from aloft, high up in the sails. Those are some of the memories I now carry from my experience on the Young Endeavour – a 44-meter-long, tall ship that was a gift from the United Kingdom to Australia to mark the Bicentenary in 1988.

The picture I just painted for you could be from any yacht that has sailed that beautiful part of the world. Yet, my voyage on the Young Endeavour carried with it many challenges. Challenges that helped push my limits, and to shape the person I am and who I wish to be. Challenges that gave me a glimpse into what the many naval personnel of Australia – past and present, do to serve and protect our country. Being able to hear the stories and experiences from the staff on board, I was able to see and reflect on the values they all carried. Ones all so similar to those of the Benalla born, Captain Hec Waller – the courageous and devoted leader whose morals now truly inspire me throughout life.



My Voyage began in Cairns where we set off into the sunset (literally) for a 10-day trip down to Airlie Beach.

Now, I'm going to pause there as I have a back story to why I am so passionate about sailing (saying that, anyone no matter your experience, should have a crack at this).

When I was a 6-year old I was introduced to sailing when we went on a six-week trip in the Kimberly in Western Australia on a not so large yacht. I loved it! Although sea sick at times or scared by the turtles that we mistook as crocodiles, it was an experience that shaped the person I am.

A goal of mine then was to climb the mast. Although being

six years old at the time my mum didn't agree on this and to be totally honest I don't think I could have pulled it off!

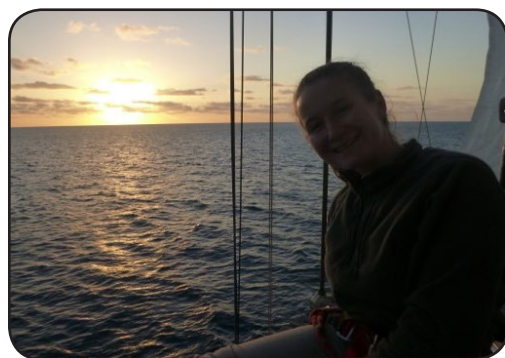
Thirteen years later on the other side of Australia there I was climbing to the Topsail Yard on my first night aboard. And yes, the adrenaline kicked in as I climbed higher and higher, but it was such an achievement that I couldn't wipe the smile from my face.

From such a high beginning, I knew the rest of the voyage would be no less than great.

The next few days consisted of tacking, setting sails, taking watch in the evenings and continuing to get to know my fellow crew. Being on watch was a great way of bonding and to reconsolidate the skills we had learnt during the day. Another plus side of being on watch is the serenity felt at night, the stars guiding the way and the soft wind in the sails. A blessing to us on our third day aboard was to go to shore at Zoey Bay where we climbed the hills to find a waterfall. Many of us feeling our sea legs as we walked but the crystal-clear waters and many freshwater fish at the falls made up for it.

We continued on towards the Whitsunday Islands. With the fourth day bringing a man overboard drill, a very friendly bird, whales and me making it to the very top of the mast, the topgallant yard. On the fifth day we anchored at Whitsunday Island after watching the sunrise in the morning from aloft. We then got to go ashore at Whitehaven Beach and mix with the many tourists and take in the beautiful views.

From here we anchored at Apostle Bay and the ships 'pool' was officially opened for us so we could jump off the bowsprit into the very blue waters. After this we then set sail, with command day near we still had many things to learn and practice. This including the setting and furling of all sails and tacking of the ship. Yet we couldn't be too serious, so we anchored at Scawfell Island and went ashore for a snorkel and some games.



The following day we were tested by the captain himself on our setting and furling of the sails as we motored (due to the lack of wind) back towards Whitsunday Island. Due to this lack of wind it was decided that we were to challenge ourselves in a different way – hiking to the peak of Whitsunday Island in very warm conditions. At the top we were rewarded with a beautiful 360 view of the nearby islands. It was well worth the hike.

Now came what we had all been waiting for – command day! And the weather, which had been sunny and windless the whole eight days, was now raining and windy. As expected for a command day. So the challenges were set – for the youthies of the Young Endeavour to circumnavigate around Whitsunday Island with no motor over a 24 hour period.

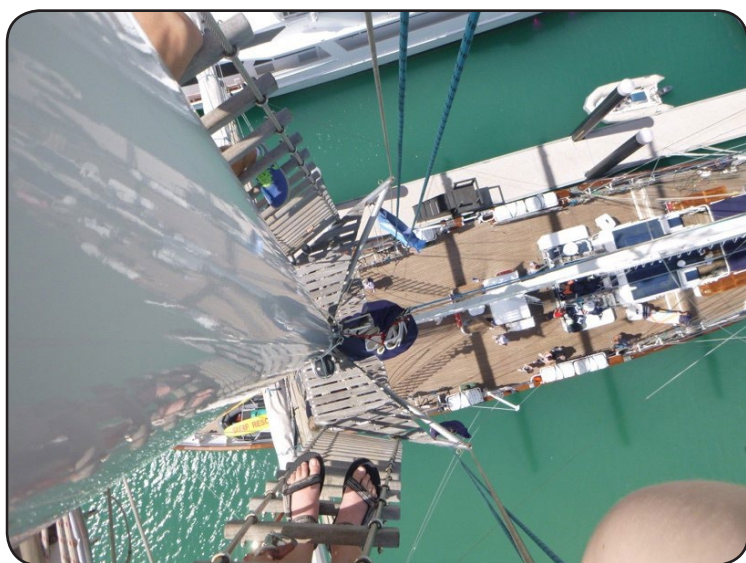


As White Watch leader I was in charge of calling when our watch were tacking or setting any sails. It was a great challenge for us all, especially in the wet weather and high winds. And yes, we all survived to the next day, after 10 tacks during the night!

We were then able to anchor and use the rope swing as a reward for all of our hard work. Here I learnt how to elegantly and not so elegantly land in the water.

The last 24 hours of a voyage was calling, and it was time to get the ship nice and tidy for our entrance into Airlie Beach. A very grand entrance might I add!

Through fun games on board we competed for our spots aloft for our entrance into Airlie Beach, and I am proud to say White Watch (my watch) made it to the top! So, I entered Airlie Beach 33 metres high sitting on the Topgallant Yard looking over a beautiful ship and laughing with my fellow crew, all with whom I had bonded over the 10 days at sea. Leaving my voyage on the Young Endeavour with an entrance I will never be able to top and an experience I will never forget.



I would like to thank the Benalla RSL for their sponsorship and support through the Captain Hec Waller Scholarship – it made the Young Endeavour program achievable for me. I would also like to emphasise to any Year 12 students

in Benalla to apply for this scholarship as it is a life changing voyage that truly challenges you and helps you grow as a person. Even if you are afraid of the sea or have never sailed, the program is for everyone and will support you in your challenges.

To anyone between the age of 16-23, who might have missed out on the generous Captain Hec Waller Scholarship, I still highly recommend applying. From what my fellow crew said, the cost for them was worth it and I believe that too, and there is always the possibility of fundraising.



I will leave you with a quote that I felt fitting for my experience on the Young Endeavour but also for life.

“You have brains in your head. You have feet in your shoes. You can steer yourself in any direction you choose. You are on your own. You know what you know. And only you’ll decide where to go.” – Dr Seuss

Former FCJ College Student receives OBE in London

Anne-Maree Keenan attended FCJ College from 1976-1979 (the College only went to Year 10 at the time).

Professor Anne-Maree Keenan has recently been awarded an OBE in the recent Queen's Birthday Honour List for her services to podiatry. Anne-Maree holds a Chair in Applied Health Research at the University of Leeds and is the Assistant Director of the Leeds Biomedical Research Centre.

After qualifying as a podiatrist in Melbourne, Anne-Maree worked in public and private sector podiatry positions, while also teaching at La Trobe University and then the University of Western Sydney. Anne-Maree left Sydney and moved to Leeds in 2002, where she was employed as a Research Fellow in the Academic Unit of Rheumatology at the University of Leeds. Her research portfolio is centred around the impact and treatment of the foot in musculoskeletal disease, with a particular emphasis on osteoarthritis.

Anne-Maree's influence reaches far outside the podiatry profession and developing the next generation of podiatry researchers. In addition to being the Assistant Director and the Training Lead for the NIHR Leeds Biomedical Research Centre, she is Deputy Chair for the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) Infrastructure Training Forum, which oversees medical, clinical and non-clinical research training across the NIHR Infrastructure. Anne-Maree has been heavily involved in the NIHR strategic review of training and is the Lead Advocate for Podiatry for NIHR.

2018 Student Residential Address and Other Information collection notice

This notice is from the Australian Government Department of Education and Training (the **department**), to advise you that the department has requested that your child's school provide a *statement of addresses*, in accordance with the *Australian Education Regulation 2013 (Cth)* (the **Regulation**).

A *statement of addresses* contains the following information about each student at the school:

- Student residential address (**not student names**)
- Student level of education (i.e. whether the student is a primary or secondary student)
- Student boarding school status (i.e. whether the student is boarding or a day student)
- Names and residential addresses of the student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s)

Schools generate a record number for each student for the purposes of this collection, which is also provided to the department.

Purpose of the collection

This collection is routinely used to inform Commonwealth school education policy, and to help ensure that Commonwealth funding arrangements for non-government schools are based on need, and are fair and transparent.

The National School Resourcing Board recently completed a review of the socio-economic status (**SES**) score methodology used in the calculation of the Commonwealth's needs-based funding arrangements for non-government schools. The information collected in the *statement of addresses* will be used to progress the Board's recommendations, which have been accepted by the Government.

Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law, including the *Privacy Act 1988 (Cth)*. Any use and disclosure of your personal information relating to the *statement of addresses* will occur in accordance with the Regulation.

Your personal information may be used by the department, or disclosed to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (the **ABS**), for the purposes of SES score policy development, reviewing SES score methodology, calculating SES scores, Commonwealth school education policy development (including school funding), or where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

For example, your personal information may be provided to the ABS for statistical and research purposes, which includes data integration projects such as the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Further information on the MADIP can be found here:

The department may, from time to time, carry out audits of school submissions. In the event of an audit, contracted auditors may seek to compare a school's *statement of addresses* with student enrolment information held by the school. These contractors will not use the information for any other purpose.

The department may also be required to disclose your personal information to contracted providers for the purposes of the provision of ICT support services to the department.

The department does not intend to disclose personal information to overseas recipients.

What do you need to do?

You are not required to do anything. Your school is responsible for providing the requested details to the department, however, please ensure that your school has the most up-to-date and correct details for your family.

Dear Parents and Guardians,

School Bus Management System

In the lead up to the 2019 school year, all travellers wishing to access School Bus Program services, are required to login to the School Bus Management System and submit their travel applications.

The school wishes to stress to parents that safety is our number one priority. If your child is not registered and is still travelling on a bus, then the School Bus Management System and our school records will not have them listed to catch the bus. In the event of an incident or a need to stop the bus, we will not know that firstly your child is on the bus and will not know to contact you.

Existing Travellers

These are students who already travel on the school bus and are registered on the School Bus Management System. If your child requires continued travel on the school bus, then you must submit a 2019 travel application.

The chart below will help families already registered on the School Bus Management System to:

- Renew Applications - If your child is already travelling and needs continued school bus access and has not changed school or home address
- Add Travellers and New Application - If you are already registered on the School Bus Management System, but have a child accessing a bus for the first time
- New Application - If your child is already travelling but has changed school or home address.

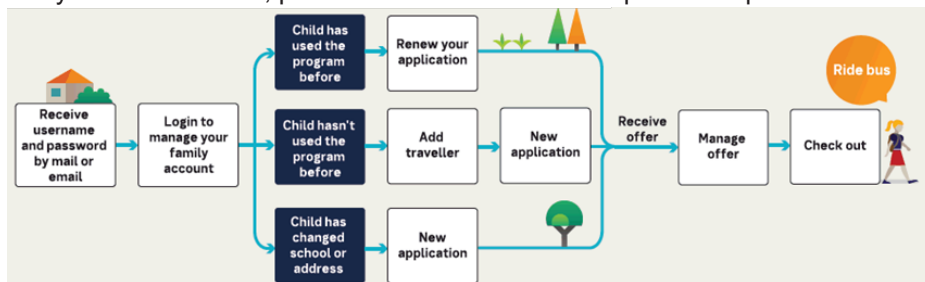


Diagram 1 - Existing Travellers

Once registered, families will be able to add travellers and submit travel applications online. For your convenience, please see the chart below to help you with the registration and application process.

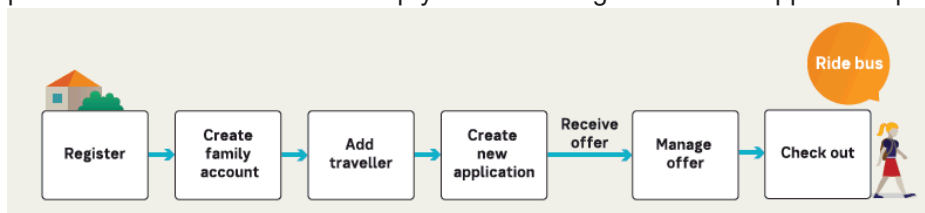


Diagram 2 - New Travellers

School Immunisation Program: FCJ College Benalla

The second round of Year 7 school immunisations is being conducted at this school on **Monday 19 November 2018**.

The following vaccines will be offered on this day:

YEAR LEVEL	VACCINES OFFERED
YEAR 7 MALE & FEMALE STUDENTS	GARDASIL9 (HPV) DOSE 2 FINAL DOSE
CATCH UP YEAR 10 MALE & FEMALE STUDENTS (Who have previously returned a consent card)	MENINGOCOCCAL ACWY – ONE DOSE ONLY

These vaccinations are funded as part of the Victorian Secondary Schools Immunisation Program. Should your child miss out on starting their vaccination course this year they will not be eligible to receive them for free in subsequent years in the school program.

Consent cards should have already been signed and completed for these vaccinations earlier this year.

If your Year 7 child missed the first dose of vaccines please contact council's immunisation team on 1800 655 360 to obtain a consent card (if consent card previously not returned). Council can administer the first dose of vaccines at school if we have a signed consent card. To complete the vaccine course, students must attend a council immunisation session or their GP, 6 months after dose 1 was given.

Year 10 students who have NOT returned a Meningococcal ACWY consent card may receive this vaccine free through a Wodonga Council session or their GP.

If your child has been vaccinated elsewhere and you have not already done so, please notify council's immunisation team on 1800 655 360. If you DO NOT wish for your child to receive any further vaccinations or if you have any enquiries about the program or your child's vaccinations, please contact Wodonga Council's Immunisation Team on 1800 655 360.
