FROM THE ARCHIVES

The Benalla Historical Society conducted a history walking tour of significant buildings in Benalla township. A large group commenced at the Gardens Rotunda and walked to FCJ College under the leadership of Maree Hanlon.

They admired the architecture and heard the history of the old convent built in 1900. They then visited the archives where they viewed the many items and photos on display.

After leaving, the group went onto the Parish House, St Joseph's Church, The Royal Hotel, The Bootmakers, The Old Court House, the Anglican Precinct and the Grandstand at the showgrounds.

Kathleen Mary Ride was born in Benalla
September 1920 to Catherine and John Ride.
She had a sister Ellen (Marge) and a brother
John. The three children attended FCJ
College and enjoyed a very happy childhood.
Their father inherited the Ride Soft Drink
Factory, a well-known industry in the town at
the time. Kathleen left school at the age of 16
and worked at Rudin's Benalla, a store selling
both men's and ladies' wear, for 9 years.

Kathleen became engaged to a young man, who wasn't a Catholic and in those days of bigotry the young man's family sent him away. She was devastated. She continued to love dancing, socialising and the attention of young men but gradually these things began to lose their allure. Kathleen decided to join the FCJ order February 1, 1945 and travelled to England and after five years of training returned in 1952 to teach at Genazzano and Richmond.

In 1971 till 1978, Sister Perpetua as she was then known, taught at St Joseph's Primary School Benalla. She loved Benalla and even after moving on to other ventures always returned to enjoy time with her family and friends. After becoming ill, she had to discontinue her teaching career of 29 years but was asked to establish the FCJ Australian Archive and began by setting up a Heritage Room at Richmond.




In the 1980s she travelled to Canada to set up the Canadian Province Archives and also formed a group to become the Association of Catholic Archivists Victoria. She was asked to establish more archives in USA, Ireland & England to name a few. Her attention to detail, her capacity for organisation, her thoroughness in all she did made her a successful archivist.

Kathleen was deeply spiritual with a very strong faith and a great love of her God. May she rest in peace (1920 -2022)

Growing up in Benalla has made me a better person. Coming from a country town and going to school at St Joesph's and FCJ College gave me life skills that I use every day. These included the need to be kind and have a purpose in life. This was one of the reasons why I went to university in Ballarat to then become a primary school teacher and PE coordinator in Seymour.

Teaching children was rewarding and based on my passion in sport, inspired me to return to university to complete a Masters in Applied Science. I soon learnt from the connections I gained with people in the sport industry, that there were a range of career opportunities available in sport. Upon graduation I worked with a great team on behalf of the Victorian government where I was the regional sport coordinator focused on building the professional development of primary and secondary school teachers. Lots of laughs and good fun.

Since igniting this spark I have travelled the world speaking at conferences and to key leaders, and provided evidence and advice to international through to local organisations to build community capacity that breaks down barriers and increases opportunities for women and girls as leaders and players in sport. For success, networking and collaborating with organisations is vital.

I have worked with colleagues in countries including Canada, USA, South East Asia and the Pacific. I have: pushed boundaries to enable policy changes that provide choice of sport uniforms for girls and women; co-led a national roadmap to assist organisations build capacity to embrace women and girls in sport and a national policy framework for women in sport; created a high level women in sport strategy for Sport Australia; was a member on the Victorian Ministerial Inquiry for Women and Girls in Sport and Active Recreation that led to the creation of the Office for Women in Sport and Recreation, the first Office of its kind in Australia; and advisor for three State/Territory Governments on infrastructure and systems to encourage women and girls in sport.


In recognition of creating change, it was an honour to be inducted into the Victorian Women's Honour Roll (2018), recognised as a Change our Game role model by the Victorian Minister for Sport (2016), and a chapter was dedicated to me in the book Oceania inspirational women: Making a difference in physical education, sport and dance (2016).

Currently I am a Director on the Oceania
Gymnastics Union; Co-Chair the inaugural Diversity
and Inclusion Council of Auscycling; and CoFounder Musical Moments Trust in support with
Challenge to help children with cancer. To assist
with a work/life balance, in the last couple of
years I stood down from my roles as Director of
Gymnastics Australia and Chair of the Australian
Women in Sport Advisory Group.

Through my experience I have learnt that we are all different and need to be proud of what we can offer. You can be what you want to be, there is no direct path in life and challenges exist - enjoy the ride and be kind to others.

VALE Refine Notan 609

Sister Celine Nolan fcJ was born 24/02/1939 in East Melbourne. She was the first of seven children to Doris & John Nolan. The family moved to Wangaratta and in 1950 to Glenrowan. She attended FCJ College Benalla as a boarder for three years of her secondary schooling as it was considered too far to travel each day to Wangaratta by bus. Celine completed her secondary schooling in 1955 and on 2 February 1956 she entered the convent. She was 16 years old. Her siblings remember her more as a nun than as a sister. She was someone they visited annually, had great afternoon teas and who they wrote to once a month. It was only in the latter years when circumstances changed that they got to know her more as a sister. Celine was also an Essendon supporter. The family forgave her for somethings this being one of them!

She began her life as a nun and a teacher from 1956 to 1973. She taught in schools in Melbourne and then in America at St Philomena's, Port Smith Rhode Island. On her return to Australia in 1970, she continued to teach at Sacred Heart Kew and Our Lady of Good Counsel Deepdene.

In 1973 Celine spent time nursing with the Little Sisters of the Poor in Northcote. This was a life changing experience as the records state she began her nursing training at Sacred Heart Hospital Moreland and in 1977 became a State Registered nurse. At the conclusion of her nurses training, Celine chose a third year of spiritual study and this took her to the UK. On returning to Australia, she returned to Sacred Heart Hospital and then to St Raphael's nursing home.

Celine was an excellent cook, and every Christmas made many Christmas cakes for family, friends and her community. She was also a wonderful knitter and her needlework was exemplary. In 1992 Celine was missioned back to Richmond and nursed at St Catherine's Balwyn and then in 1998, Celine began her life as a Pastoral Associate working with new immigrants, running sacramental programs and overseeing bereavement teams. She was particularly loved by those from East Timor.

Celine also loved her feline friends, Trixie, Tommie and Millie. Celine arrived back in Benalla in 2007 and became part of the parish of St Joseph's. This period in Benalla could be seen as a preparation for God's final plan for her. She met her dear friend Margaret Brough who became such a great support to her. She also returned to where she encountered the FCJs as a boarder and was able to renew and catch up with her old friends from her school days. This was one thing about Celine, if you became her friend, you were a friend for life. Her loyalty knew no bounds.

Celine became a familiar sight at FCJ College. She could be seen walking across to the College Chapel to set up for Mass. She was devoted to this duty for many years whilst her body would carry her. Altar linen was always pristine and beautifully ironed. All would be in readiness for the celebrant and the students.

foundress Marie Madeline "We bear the name of Jesus and

At the end of 2022, we congratulated and thanked Mark McDonald for 22 years of loyal service to FCJ College Benalla in his role as Business Manager. During his time at FCJ College, Mark oversaw many changes to the College and many different building programs! It is true what they say about Mark, he was the beating heart of FCJ College and it will certainly be a very different place without him. As a Business Manager, Mark had a very public face but also did a tremendous amount of work behind the scenes. 
CLASS OF 2012 REUNION
